was last year, we were still able to reach a quorum and did not have to postpone the meeting.

This summer and fall we received more requests for line extensions and new service builds than we have in many years. Our staff makes sure these are done in a timely manner and works with members every step of the way.

We reached an agreement with Richland County for them to purchase our existing headquarters building for the ambulance service. Since building our service center in the industrial park several years ago, most of our equipment, including trucks and materials, have been located there. For convenience, our line staff reports there for work each day, while office staff reports to the headquarters building. Changing work methods and the move by Genuine Telecom to a new building gave us the opportunity to look at selling our building and constructing new offices at our service center location. Possible designs are being considered now, and plans are underway for providing ongoing services during the time between when we move out this coming spring and our when new offices can be ready.

We were one of three electric cooperatives that worked together to bring the nationally renowned Touchstone Energy Balloon to the Viola Horse and Colt Show to help check an item off people's bucket lists. By doing so we received a \$510 donation from the Touchstone Energy Balloon, which we presented to the Kickapoo Science Club.

Chief Operations Officer Larry Hallett received the prestigious Herman C. Potthast award, which recognizes

outstanding service, dedication, leadership, and cooperation among electric cooperatives, with a focus on safety.

Unfortunately, we were unable to host our member appreciation picnic for the second straight year; however, we countered that by providing gift cards to local businesses via drawings. We also wanted to make sure that our kids were involved by having the grand prize be for youth. This year we purchased a bike and presented it to Teige Perkins, our grand prize winner.


